

MONTREAL-ARCHIMAP is a cartographic device available on various platforms and optimized for smartphones. It is offered by Université de Montréal celebrating the 375th anniversary of Montreal and conceived by professors Nicholas Roquet and Jean-Pierre Chupin, at the Research Chair on Competitions and the LEAP Lab with support from the Bureau Recherche - Développement - Valorisation.

MONTREAL-ARCHIMAP provides direction to some of the best architectural projects designed - and most often built - in Montreal between 1992 and 2017. These projects bear witness to excellence and creativity in architecture, urban planning and landscape architecture. The interactive map can be simply viewed or explored in depth. Since they are linked to the documentary database of the **Canadian Competitions Catalogue** (www.ccc.umontreal.ca), they give access both to the "real" and imagined Montreal.

MONTREAL-ARCHIMAP allows users to generate their own map with their choices and to browse Montreal's architecture by city sector or by theme. It also provides information about the selected projects and the architects (with links to the firm's websites) in addition to giving access to a virtual visit (streetview) or to open an itinerary on *Google maps*.
